# PHIL 1301 Introduction to Philosophy (3801015112)

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**Course Description:** A study of major issues in philosophy and/or the work of major philosophical figures in philosophy. Topics in philosophy may include theories of reality, theories of knowledge, theories of value, and their practical applications.

# **Course Learning Outcomes:**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Read, analyze, and critique philosophical texts.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of key concepts, major arguments, problems, and terminology in philosophy.
- 3. Present logically persuasive arguments both orally and in writing.
- 4. Demonstrate critical thinking skills in evaluation and application of philosophical concepts to various aspects of life.
- 5. Evaluate the personal and social responsibilities of living in a diverse world.

#### **Course Outline:**

There are three required texts for the course: *Existentialism is a Humanism* by Jean-Paul Sartre, *The Myth of Sisyphus* by Albert Camus, and *Fear and Trembling* by Soren Kierkegaard. Each student will come to class having completed the assigned reading for the day and will participate in daily discussions, orally presenting logically persuasive arguments. Each student will also complete a writing assignment for each assigned reading, which will involve reading and analyzing philosophical texts, along with presenting logically persuasive arguments in writing. Each lecture and discussion will pertain to the assigned reading and the philosophy of the author under discussion.

Each student will write a three to four page essay explaining and evaluating Jean-Paul Sartre's existentialism as expressed in his lecture "Existentialism is a Humanism." Doing so will require reading, analyzing, and critiquing a philosophical text, demonstrating knowledge of key concepts, major arguments, problems, and terminology in philosophy, presenting logically persuasive arguments in writing, and demonstrating critical thinking skills in the evaluation and application of philosophical concepts to various aspects of life.

Each student will write a three to four page essay explaining and evaluating Albert Camus's absurdism as expressed in his essay "The Myth of Sisyphus." Doing so will require reading, analyzing, and critiquing a philosophical text, demonstrating knowledge of key concepts, major arguments, problems, and terminology in philosophy, presenting logically persuasive arguments in writing, and demonstrating critical thinking skills in the evaluation and application of philosophical concepts to various aspects of life.

Each student will write a three to four page essay explaining and evaluating Soren Kierkegaard's fideism as expressed in his book *Fear and Trembling*. Doing so will require reading, analyzing, and critiquing a philosophical text, demonstrating knowledge of key concepts, major arguments, problems, and terminology in philosophy, presenting logically persuasive arguments in writing, and demonstrating critical thinking skills in the evaluation and application of philosophical concepts to various aspects of life.
